



## Poll Finds Women More Likely to Support Harsher Drug Sentencing Laws

Women are significantly more punitive than men when it comes to drug sentencing, according to a U.S. telephone poll conducted earlier this year. Over one-half of men believe that too many people are put in jail just for drugs, compared to only 40% of women. Men were more likely to support eliminating mandatory drug sentences for non-violent drug offenders (52% vs. 42%). Interestingly, "this gap exists despite the fact that women are about as likely as men to consider drug use to be a disease rather than a crime" (*Other Important Findings and Analyses*, p. 1).
