

U.S. Illicit Drug Expenditures Stable at About \$65 Billion

U.S. residents spent an estimated \$62.4 billion on illicit drugs in 2000, according to the recently released *National Drug Control Strategy: 2001 Annual Report*. Following a sharp decrease from \$115.7 billion in 1988 to \$70.5 billion in 1993, illicit drug expenditures in the U.S. have remained relatively stable at around \$65 billion. It is estimated that the majority of this money was spent on the purchase of cocaine (\$36.1 billion), followed by heroin (\$11.9 billion) and marijuana (\$10.4 billion) in 2000.
