



Illicit Drug Use Rates Are Highest in Western and Northeastern U.S. States

The percentage of U.S. residents reporting the use of any illicit drug (primarily marijuana) in the past month ranged from 6.3% in Utah to 12.0% in Alaska, according to an analysis of data from the 2002 and 2003 National Surveys on Drug Use and Health. States in the western and northeastern regions of the country typically had the highest rates of past month use, while the lowest rates were found in southern states (see figure below).
