Maryland Drug Early Warning System Ending; DEWS Publications Available on CESAR's Website

The Maryland Drug Early Warning System (DEWS) began in 1998 at the request of the Governor's office. DEWS was designed to provide the State with advance warning of emerging drug problems. For example, in 2000, the DEWS program detected emerging ecstasy use by youths in Maryland and enabled policymakers to draft effective responses. To head off the problem, Maryland launched a comprehensive ecstasy action plan, including the first state-produced ecstasy public service announcement. CESAR staff also used DEWS information to work with state agencies to win millions of dollars in research grants. DEWS funding from the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention (GOCCP) ended on June 30, 2006. This is the final issue of the *DEWS Fax*.
